Mostly this column deals with 'connections', however obscure or farfetched the subject may appear to be in relation to such a worthy theme. But thanks to an extraordinary discovery recently made by one of our archival researchers, today's theme is 'disconnections'.

Let me hasten to explain.

Over the past weeks, as the saga of Ken Russell's application for a 2.5 ministry position in the Parish has unfolded (yes, that's one quarter of a full-time ministry, which leaves little actual time and less money for the recipient) this Parish, which thought it was part of a Church which prided itself on being a 'connexion' has discovered a massive *disconnection* between its own local planning and the wishes of the Pastoral Committee, a group of senior Methodist officials whose brief is to deal with those ministers who have retired from a full-time active ministry but who seem to have taken it upon themselves to direct the whole future strategy of the Parish.

Rescued from a dustbin in a less than savoury quarter of the city, a tattered manuscript has emerged, penned—it seems—by an anonymous pair of hack writers, since on the back of the manuscript in an almost illegible hand is written, 'Decomposed by Wally Gilbert and Ed Sullivan, 1 April 2011.'

The document is now reproduced in its entirety, without editorial comment of any kind.

Oh the Pastoral Committee's a mysterious affair: For it's mostly made of members who are almost never there, For one is off to China and another's in Peru, And they can't make a decision till they meet in Timbuktoo. Praise the Pastoral Committee
In this wise and foolish ditty,
For their muddlement, befuddlement,
On quite divine a scale;
For they leave we foolish simpletons,
Us wrinklies, dolts and dimpletons,
Like Jonah—left to wallow
In the belly of the whale.

They're the shepherds of the shepherds who have reached their use-by date,

They can leave the pen wide open or decide to shut the gate; They're the pastoral committee who can tell what's good for you, And the silly sheep left milling in their paddock in a stew.

Now the Pastoral Committee's life is lived behind a cloud, Where they cogitate on what is not and what may be allowed; All their information's private and may never be divulged, Leaving public speculation unrestrainedly indulged.

Well, our Pastoral Committee sits like Solomon the Wise: Not a fault or peccadillo can escape their piercing eyes. They can tell who's lost their marbles or the plot at sixty-nine, They can place the very moment you're in terminal decline.

All their deep deliberations are unhurried (rightly so), Since they reach determination in a century or so, Then they issue their conclusions in so secretive a way Their ineffable directions never reach the light of day.

One can only hope that we are all *reconnected* with the Connexion in an amiable resolution of the Parish's problem, and are permitted to form a ministry team ready and capable of giving our single full-time minister, Siosifa, the support that he needs.
