HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 25 MAY 2011

- The Parish Council authorised the Parish Stewards to compensate its ordained ministers for services rendered to the Parish.
- The Parish will continue with stationing in 2011 to seek an additional 0.25 ministry.
- George Davis has agreed to convene a Task Group responsible for establishing a Lay Ministry Team to assist with Parish ministry.
- The Parish will seek a Pastoral Convener to assist Siosifa with coordinating pastoral care across the Parish.
- Parish income for the January - March 2011 quarter was \$1,530 more than expenditure.

It is no exaggeration to say that my recent Testimony offered during morning worship has excited a wide range of positive comment - including mention in one of Ken's sermons. For this reason I thought it would be helpful to venture further by way of expressing convictions that a 4-5 minute allocation did not allow for.

Psychic (or spiritual) suffering is so terribly hard to understand in its essential NATURE and PURPOSE. Has mine had a "purpose" or has it just been a case of bad luck to have had an accident triggering memories of a much more serious event 30 years before? Well, both I would say. There does seem to be so much that is random and cruel - as with the Christchurch earthquakes and the Japanese catastrophe. And the more random and cruel the events, the harder it is to seriously consider that there is a God or Christ "managing things." IS His eye on the sparrow....or on me, on you? Haven't we all in the quiet times asked this question? I certainly have.

Well, in my Testimony I remember saying that as I looked out over the Mornington congregation I saw Jesus in you...in your rich concern, immediate offers of prayer....and home cooked biscuits!

I think I have read too much theology over the years - e.g. the many books dealing with the figure of Jesus Christ from every conceivable angle. As I glance over those books on my shelves I feel no spark of interest. I don't wish to look at them again. I wish to give up speculating, and to SEE Jesus, to shake Jesus by the hand, to hug Jesus - especially today in the form of some of the great women in the congregation. Now Judy gives a great hug!! Seriously, through this whole terrifying experience, I have somehow re-discovered women. The former Catholic monk is running full-tilt in the opposite direction! Interestingly, a prominent American psychotherapist pointed out that in a personal chart she completed for me, the feminine was pretty much absent. She said that I needed to address this issue urgently! I have been trying to do that one way and another in the domestic sphere - as with our weekly honouring of the Madonna in the form of a very special statue we have at home.

Maybe I have among other things been too greedy for things spiritual. As one counsellor put it bluntly: "God's remedy for spiritual gluttony and other obstacles to maturity is the Dark Night experience...For God sets them in this Night only to prove them and to humble them, and to reform their desires, so that they go on, not nurturing in themselves a sinful gluttony in spiritual things." (St. John of the Cross)

When this journey is over, I am sure you will be dealing with an Aelred focussed on realism and actions that matter.

All the way of my long journey, it has been Mother Julian of Norwich (a 14th century English hermit) who has given me the deeper help I have needed - especially in the words

ALL SHALL BE WELL,
AND ALL SHALL BE WELL,
AND ALL MANNER OF THINGS
SHALL BE WELL.....[for me as well!]

Why? Because there IS a justice and a balance of things in the universe. In other words, in some difficult-to-understand sense, the universe in its incomprehensible vastness, knows us as INDIVIDUAL CREATIONS.

I keep myself focussed on what is GOOD - "WELL" (in other words, God/Jesus Christ right there in front of me!) I do this many, many times a day, and correspondingly deny a place to thoughts, ideas, impulses which are negative and destructive. By the same token, as my counsellor clearly advises, don't use Mother Julian's words to block out thoughts which, though unpleasant, need to be engaged with in some way.

Fr. Thomas Merton was much impressed by Julian's realism, citing her admission that there is no intellectual solution to the problem of evil (and pain, for that matter), BUT THAT WE MUST TRUST THAT ALL WILL BE WELL. In her theology God and Christ are "our MOTHER." Julian insists that the Trinity is our Mother " in whom we are enclosed." (Ch. 54 of her book REVELATIONS OF DIVINE LOVE)

So my deep thanks go to the mothers of our Church. You are sweet, gracious, humble, and in the best sense of the word, truly great.
