WORLD METHODIST COUNCIL STATEMENT ON BOSTON MARATHON BOMBING

Yesterday marked the unofficial beginning of spring in Boston, Massachusetts - Patriot Day. During this celebration the city and the people in the city suffered a thoughtless and callous attack: two bombs were detonated during the running of the Boston Marathon.

The grim and sad toll so far - three dead and nearly one hundred wounded - is a small number compared to the violence that still occurs every day throughout the world, and whatever twisted justification for the attack is still yet to be discovered. This is a day spent regrouping and asking questions about how and why attacks like this happen, but it can also be a moment to ask what the appropriate response should be.

For some people - after seeing the video footage and photographs of the terror and suffering that filled the streets of Boston after the attack - they can respond with anger, with bitterness and with a desire for revenge. But we may also make an effort to comprehend, to take those images and replace the fear and disbelief with an effort to understand, compassion and love.

As believers in Christ we must not greet the cacophony of explosions with even louder drums of war and fear, but instead with the calm and peace of grace.

The Greek poet Aeschylus wrote: "Even in our sleep, pain which cannot forget falls drop by drop upon the heart, until, in our own despair, against our will, comes wisdom through the awful grace of God."

As members of a global family who believe in the salvation offered through Christ's death and resurrection, and the teachings of John Wesley, The World Methodist Council asks that those affected, personally

or peripherally by the horrors of not only yesterday's violence, but any violence to not respond with hatred and further violence, but instead to reply with love and wisdom, compassion towards one another, and a feeling of justice towards those who still suffer from the effects of these acts of terror.

STORY FROM THE MISSION

A young Dad phoned looking for support to access childcare and enquire about subsidies. With his partner and two young children, they moved to Dunedin from the top of the North Island to be closer to her family. They set up house, Dad got himself into Polytech and a part time job working in a kitchen. Sadly, within a few weeks the partner ended the relationship and asked the Dad to leave. Already enrolled in Polytech and not wanting to leave his children, Dad found a two bedroom flat and was given access to the children overnight on Mondays and Tuesdays. He needed childcare for these two days while he attended Polytech. The Mum had already enrolled the children in daycare which used all the allocated WINZ subsidies, meaning Dad was unable to access any subsidy support for his allocated days. Being on a student allowance he was unable to afford the \$180 for two days care. When the Support and Advocacy worker visited his home, he had very little resources and household items; he was sleeping on an airbed, had limited kitchen utensils, no furniture to sit on and he had a box in the corner with his study notes on it. His first priority was to find a way to continue to attend Polytech whilst not forfeiting his rights to see and have his children. He has no family or supports in Dunedin and only the friends he has, he met at his new job. His expartner was not open to changing days or accommodating his situation. He let Polytech know of his situation and they granted extra time to get himself sorted. Affordability for childcare was the main issues and his income was definitely unable to meet the fees. After some calls home to his family, it was decided that his younger sister and nephew would move down for a period of time and live with him while caring for his two young children on Mondays and Tuesdays. A short term solution while he finishes at Polytech. With that issue solved in the meantime, he needed to gather household items to accommodate having the children overnight. He visited Rona's Room at the Hub and we were able to supply kitchen items, bedding and blankets, books and toys for the children's rooms, cushions to sit on, a BBQ and a study desk. A very humbled young man who was overwhelmed by the support offered. He was invited to bring his sister, nephew and children down to the Hub to participate in the play groups and coffee mornings as a way to integrate into a new community and meet new people.

There are many Creation myths. As with any story handed down from generation to generation, there is an element of truth in every story. These truths are gathered together for the first time in one story.
