- Methodist Conference is being held every 2 years until 2020, then review. 2018 in Christchurch.
- President Rev Prince Devanandan (Sri Lankan); vice-president Viv Whimster.
- Theme: *Moored to Christ, Moving into Mission*. Image of canoes tied to a strong post.
- We couldn't reach a consensus on president and vice-president elect.
- We ordained five people, with a huge Tongan choir and band participating.
- Buildings under 34% NBS must be closed or strengthened unless an engineer says they are fit to occupy. Many churches are struggling with this.
- We need to comply with new Health and Safety law.
- Wesley College farm is being sold gradually to create a whole new town. The school will be rebuilt elsewhere.
- Let the Children Live is halfway so we were encouraged to keep working on this focus and find new ways to make it happen.
- with the government by talking to the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition.
- We were represented at the World Uniting Church Women gathering, which resulted in having 2 of the 4 exec members from Aotearoa – Mata'iva Robertson (sec) and Leu Pupulu (treas)!
- The new Connexional offices "Weteriana House" will be opened at 50 Langdons Road, Papanui, Christchurch on Friday Dec 9th 2.30pm.
- We asked the President to make a statement challenging the Government to reduce child poverty by 10% by the end of 2017.





STORY FROM THE MISSION

Client Support: We have been able to support a Mum who has not had the care of her child from a very young age come to terms with her now teenager, wanting to be

adopted by her foster parents who she has lived with for most of her life. This Mums own life, from a very young age, has been traumatic and continues to impact on her today. Initially she was resistant to the request by the foster parents. She felt powerless and that things were 'out of her hands'. She didn't want her child thinking she didn't want her, and she didn't want to relinquish her rights as the child's biological Mum by agreeing to the adoption. She struggled with her own thoughts and feelings of how throughout her life, systems and people

had failed her, and now the legal request for her child to be adopted was another 'kick in the teeth'. The strength this Mum had was in acknowledging the good care the foster parents were taking of her child and that they provided this when she couldn't. She was clear she wanted the best for her child but she didn't want to lose her. She showed insight as she was able to talk about the possible consequences if she was or was not to sign the applications in terms of a relationship with her child in the future as did not want her child to resent her. While the Mum fought with her emotions and after discussions she was able to reframe the situation to make sense for She was able to see that she was a good Mum in allowing her. someone to take care of her child when she couldn't, and that she was also a good Mum in granting her child a very special request – which was to be adopted by her foster parents. So she agreed to sign the adoption papers and also wrote a letter to her child letting her know why she agreed with her child's request.

This was a big decision in this Mums life and one that caused her great upset. She is happy with her decision not to fight the adoption and looks forward to the day her child comes to her wanting to know her identity. Her decision has also paved a new relationship between herself and the foster parents, and they are happy to keep in touch with her over time.
