She is currently a senior astrophysicist at the Goddard Space Flight Center, where she previously headed the Laboratory for Exoplanets and Stellar Astrophysics.

STORY FROM THE MISSION

Ōtepoti YTH: It's been a busy month at the YT House. All the gutters and windows have been cleaned the grass mowed and the beds have arrived. The back fence has been repaired and we have managed to keep one of the apple trees .The Open Home on Friday 26th January was well attended with more than 60 people coming along. There were representatives from all our referral agencies, other NGOs and members of the Methodist Parish. We have since had visits from Oranga Tamariki Case Workers, people keen to volunteer and Case Managers from Work and Income. Everyone has been keen to find out about our criteria and how to refer. The House has been well equipped from the many generous donations we have received. We have three freezers, so have had a conversation with Kiwi Harvest and they will be supplying us with some food staples like bread, vegies and whatever else may be available throughout the year and there is a plan to buy in bulk whenever possible with the help of Dianne at the Little Citizens Kitchen.



DID GLORY LIGHT HIS YOUTHFUL FACE......?

How often, over the course of your life, have you had a truly exceptional moment or experience when you felt transported to a higher plane? It might have been triggered by an event, a sunset or sunrise, a piece of music or a work of art, a moment of sheer joy which continues to thrill to your soul when recalled. One such moment happened as a friend and I, traveling to

Gore in the wee small hours, were treated to a glorious sight south of Clinton. It was a beautiful night, the Milky Way particularly clear and the stars more numerous and brighter than usual. Suddenly, the heavens were transformed into a huge vaulted cosmic cathedral. Aurora Australis soared, swooped and danced around this heavenly space. We stopped, got out of the car. Not a sound broke the 'stilly night'. Even the animals in the fields uttered not a sound as if, like us, they wanted to capture in their memories, this awe-inspiring moment. Truly a transcendent experience.

The dictionary defines 'transcendent' as, going beyond normal or physical human experience....not limited by the material universe. Obviously an Aurora is of the material universe, but its affect transcended a 'normal' experience. For me, it was a 'God' moment.

I sometimes recall this experience especially during Lent and wonder if Jesus, during the course

of his short life, had many such experiences. His baptism, desert, mountain top and transfiguration experiences would qualify as such. However, I keep being drawn back to his experience in the garden where his agony, fear, and deep distress were blurted out as he prayed that 'this cup might pass from him'. He didn't want to die.

At what point in his short life did he first become aware that his life was not going to end well? Would his transcendent moments have been sufficient to nourish his soul as he faced the horror to come? And...

Did glory light his youthful face
as breathlessly he gazed with joy upon the royal hues
of gay Anemones?
And did he ponder
wondering if he could bear to
close his eyes for a last time
upon the grandeur and the

sweet of sunset on the sea and dew upon the Cedar trees?.......

The poet, assuming Jesus' awareness of his untimely death, is reflecting on what might have been in Jesus' mind as he pondered the beauty of creation and the sweetness of life. It caught my attention. The poetically crafted language invoked the sights, smells and sounds of nature capturing the feelings one has when confronted with jaw dropping beauty. If Jesus had foreknowledge his life would end in a terrible and untimely way, it is comforting to think he experienced times when he was able to transcend the dark place this knowledge would have occupied in his consciousness.

None the less, life would have been hard, uncomfortable and full of risk because he chose the 'road less traveled', living counter-intuitively to family, culture, contemporaries, his faith community and authorities. A few weeks ago, Marcia reminded us of the 'angry Jesus' when he banished the money changers from the temple because they were fleecing people as they prepared to offer their sacred rituals. Jesus' humanity meant he knew the fullness of life in all its messy dysfunction and glorious moments.....

.....And was it then while beauty blessed his mind and health gave vigour to his limbs and grace his spirit crowned...... that Jesus young and strong and glad spoke to his own heart thus — what greater love could be than his, who, for his friends will die?

Jesus death was political..he put his life on the line repeatedly when he stood firmly against Roman oppression and other forms of injustice.

My caveat to myself when reading this poem, crafted in the language of romance and gentility, is the danger of sentimentalising and sanitising Jesus life and horrific death.

I need to keep in mind the less than transcendent reality of his daily life, a life lived on the edge, and his death, crucifixion without glory.

The Jesus way was the way 'less traveled'. A way of risk culminating in violent death leaving his Mother and followers in overwhelming grief, fear and despair. Nothing very sentimental or romantic here.

Yet

Easter Sunday saw transcendence birth new hope. We don't know what really happened, but something did. The post resurrection church took a long long time to regroup and become a dynamic institution. Different beliefs caused strife and tension in the nascent church and the world was often indifferent, sometimes hostile to its influence. But it survived by fair and sometimes foul means... the Church by any definition is an imperfect organisation, but that does not invalidate it. In some form or other, I believe it will continue to survive.

Transcendent moments, or God moments, are gifts which sometimes we recognise only retrospectively.

Rather like Jacob who was compelled to acknowledge that 'Surely God was in this place and I didn't know it'

This Easter Sunday may we continue to take hope, inspired by those transcendent moments when God breaks into the dailiness of our living, nourishing our interior lives and providing the impetus to do what needs to be done, to enable rebirth of the Church in the face of steady decline.
