STORY FROM THE MISSION Ōtēpoti YTH



One resident that we had in the

house during the lock down has now moved out and living in a flatting situation. He was basically skipping out of the house with a big smile on his face and the change in attitude from when he started at the house and up until he left was amazing. He opened right up and appeared confident and content with where he was at and what the future held for him. Before he left he cooked the staff a meal as a show of appreciation. He has been in touch since leaving and his mood is the same as when he left.

On the day he left we had another resident move into the house. She has been an excellent addition to the house. She is of Maori (Kai Tahu), Samoan and Pakeha decent. She is 17 years of age and has been through a lot during her young age. Her mother died 8 months ago which can been a very traumatic experience for anyone let alone a 17 year old. On top of this, she was responsible for her mothers' care for 18 months prior to her passing. Coupled with this she has no real family support and is entirely on her own. Up until coming to the house she has been in various emergency housing situations. When I went to pick her up from her last residence (a motel) there were 30 gang members out in the driveway. As you can imagine she was very happy to leave that motel and come to the house. Upon seeing her room at the house she started crying and stated that the last time she had her bed made for her was by her mother before she passed. She has been at the house for just over a week and the change is obvious. She is laughing, smiling, positive and engages well with others.

We have also had another resident start at the house. He is a young Maori male of Kai Tahu decent aged 18. He is very quiet and has a strong belief in god and the scriptures (he went to a Seventh Day Adventist boarding school in Palmerston North). Once he joined the

house and we had completed the paper work, he went to meet and chat with the other resident. After an hour or so I went to check up on them in the lounge and they were playing monopoly and laughing together.
