ON FEELING AWKWARD

I recently gave an interview to the ODT about the Labour Party's

promise to give over 65's a health care subsidy.

The reporter asked about whether I thought that was it necessary to provide this subsidy, because the research showed older people doing (comparatively – and that's an important word, so I'll come back to it) better than younger people.

We had a really interesting conversation. During which I mentioned Dr David Thomson's work on the baby boomer generation across a range of articles and one book, which he called "The Selfish Generation". I also mentioned the work of Dr Jonathan Boston, Max Rashbrooke, and others. I had statistics and considered reflections.

The next day the article started with me calling older people selfish.

Well, it's one way to get attention.

Several people rang up the office and when they couldn't get me, they yelled at Katrina. Really. Shouted. More emailed their disgust.

Several said they would never support us again (to my surprise because I wasn't aware they were doing that in the first place). One told me to resign. Most said I should publicly apologise.

Almost all had stories of personal hardship, hardwork, and never having taken anything from anyone. Quite a few mentioned that young people today were bludgers and needed to develop a better work ethic.

I rang the reporter back and congratulated her.

So for the record, and just in case anyone was wondering, I don't think baby boomers are selfish.

But. There are some awkward facts. They are the only generation that has fully benefited from all the welfare state has offered – health care when it was completely free, tertiary education without massive fees and loans, state houses when they were new, welfare benefits, national super (for a time) and now superannuation at 65 (an age most countries can now not afford), and now free public transport (gold card). Boomers are the <u>only</u> group in society that have enjoyed <u>all</u> those advantages.

Boomers also have an unfortunate tendency to vote for political parties that are happy to deny those entitlements to the generations that have followed.

As many of you also know, New Zealand is very unusual amongst OECD countries for the degree to which we protect the elderly from poverty (3-4%, particularly when we compare how happy we are to expose children to it (20-25%).

None of which is to say that the over 65s are overly well off, or shouldn't be getting the support they do.

None of which is to say that we shouldn't try harder for older people.

But the interview was about the Labour party's announcement of additional funding for a group that is already <u>comparatively</u> so far ahead that it was clearly vote-buying.

Going by the emails and the phone calls I got, they have locked up a (fairly grumpy) block of voters in Dunedin with this announcement!
