ONE-DAY **FLIGHT** TO CHRISTCHURCH last week was ostensibly to lead a workshop on New Zealand hymn writing - something he is well qualified to do, and something he has done many times before in various parts of the country. But this particular visit, to the Mary Potter Centre, was to be something special. be Colin was invested to Honorary Membership of the Royal School of Church Music (London) for services to church music. (Hon RSCM)

We celebrate this award with Colin, and we in Dunedin Parish of all people should know it is well deserved. We

have had the immense honour, in many cases, of being the first to sing hymns that eventually became best loved among contemporary hymns in congregations within and beyond New Zealand.

But few of us, even, have any idea of how prolific a hymn writer Colin has become. He has written some 600 hymns, of which about 500 have been published. Shades of Charles Wesley!

One of about 50 people at the function at Christchurch wrote the following day "Have to report a marvellous evening with Colin.... I'd sung a number of the hymns, but had never had such a full and compelling commentary on their origin and significance theologically as well as socially. How blest Mornington (and indeed NZ Methodism) is to have such a gifted hymn writer, musician and expositor. Long may he survive!"

- 4) Helpful experience overall.






THE DEFENCE MINISTER'S TELEGRAM

One hundred years ago to the day, virtually – Sunday September 24th 1916 - my maternal grandparents

would have walked to the local Methodist church in the morning, as they had both done all their lives. My mother, in her late teens, and her eldest sister, would have been with them. All three brothers were overseas.

Doubtless, as Frank and Mary met up with their friends at the church door, news would have been exchanged about the boys — "Have you heard from them recently?" Maybe they had. Just as likely, someone remarked, "Did you hear that so-and-so's boy was killed at?", yet another casualty in the Battle of the Somme. Like George Byford Sheridan, a young man of promise from Blenheim, promoted to lieutenant, and a minister of the Methodist Church, killed in action a few days earlier.

My grandparents did not know that their eldest son, Bert, had been killed at Flers on the 20th. They would not know for another week – when they received their telegram from the Minister of Defence.

In the words of John Masefield, we don't need to be 'triumphantly laurelled' to grieve. All the medals in the world won't bring one hero back to life. All the words honouring bravery and self-sacrifice, however justified, however necessary, cannot hide the grotesque folly, the senseless carnage, the broken promises. A three-year-old child in Aleppo knows more about war than we ever will.

What hope, therefore, do we have that our Prime Minister, bearing so grave a responsibility as is that of the Presidency of the Security Council, will be able to achieve anything whatsoever. Will he be prepared to put our trade agreements with the United States, with Russia, with China, with India, with the EU, on the line for the sake of peace. Will he be able to say what should, what must be said, to the so-called 'Great Powers'?

The time has run out for platitudes and posturing. Will he challenge them to show greatness by putting peace first - before trade, before Olympic medals, before ethnic purity, before armaments. Will John Key challenge them to look into the eyes of the maimed-for-life child in Aleppo, with a bullet in her spine, and not flinch.

How far does our honouring of the past deflect us from our responsibility towards the present. The one must not replace the other. Jesus of Nazareth was a man in a hurry – for him the present was always more important than the past. The past can be honoured with a sincere prayer – and the shorter the better. This present moment will be honoured if it is the beginning of peace. Our country could give the lead.
