## **STORIES FROM THE MISSION**

*Incredible years programme:* The is going well, with a very engaged group of parents who are participating enthusiastically in group discussions and activities. We have a focus on expressing ourselves positively, looking for the good things and turning our instructions from a negative command to a positive one. For example, instead of saying 'don't run in the house', one parent found that using the positive alternative of 'please walk inside' was much more effective. Looking for positive behaviours to praise, such as sharing or playing quietly, helped the parent see that her children were doing a lot of good things and reduced the need to correct them. Another parent said that her son wouldn't accept praise, even when he had done something well. After our session on Effective Praise and Encouragement, she found that when she 'labelled' the praise, that is, let him know exactly what it was that she liked about what he was doing, he really enjoyed the attention and encouragement. It's great to hear parents telling us how well their children have responded to attention, encouragement and reward programmes such as sticker charts to make progress and learn new skills. One parent said that her son had really struggled with his toilet training until she put in place a consistent reward programme, and he had now had a whole week dry.

*Take 10 Streets:* The last few weeks for the Take 10 Streets Project has been busy with meeting residents of the area despite the unpredictable weather, understandably, if it is cold and windy they do not want to

open the door. The type of resident has been wide and varied, from young, single parents, young families, someone on home detention, the elderly, some older families too; also a fairly high percentage of people who have lived in the South Dunedin area for a long time or returning from time away. The prospect of a Library coming into the area has caused quite a buzz of excitement to all. Dawn has been engaging with many of the residents who had previously expressed the need for a library as part of their desire for South Dunedin in conversations with her. She was working with them to encourage them to attend the council consultation meetings, to connect people who had similar ideas and views around the library to head together to the meetings, and to ensure they had access to all the council information before the meetings.

## **CHILD POVERTY**

At the MCNZ Conference in Pukekohe a couple of weeks ago the Public Issues Network put a resolution asking Conference to agree with the Children's Commissioner that the government should reduce the number of children in poverty by 10% from 150,000 by 2020.

To which some of us immediately objected. (I may have been one of them.) I know, you've all wondered for quite a while what it is that's wrong with me and now this!!

Let me explain.

In business the rule is "you manage what you measure" and right now there is no agreement to how many children are in poverty because there is no measure. But most of the estimates hover around 220-250,000.

So the first objection was that we were about to let the government off doing anything for maybe as much as 40% of the children in need, 100,000 of them. Even at a 10% reduction goal that would be 10,000 children who missed out on help.

Getting a poverty measure sorted - and there are several to pick from, it's not *that* hard - is the first step. Let's make sure we're counting **all** the kids in need. I'm really pleased Conference has now asked for an official poverty measure to be set.

The next thing that itched was: what, only 10%? That's it? In 2012 previous Children's Commissioner had an Expert Advisory Group that came up with 78 recommendations, 11 of them high priority, to reduce child poverty **drastically**.

(None of which have been picked up by government.)

10% is puny. 10% is 225,000 children STILL in poverty. 10% is Not. Good. Enough.

But 10% is fine if it is just a start, so the decision of Conference now says 10% sure, in the first couple of years, but 50% right after that and no slacking please.

And then there was a final thing. You know, centre-right governments aren't naturals at working with poverty. It's not really something they like to talk about, and it's a bit embarrassing; it doesn't fit their narrative about we're all individuals and there's no such thing as "society". So there's some ignorance there that has to be dealt with.

But we're Methodists, we're all about the Good Samaritan, we can help them over this hump with **how** they can reduce child poverty.

Which is why the decision of Conference now says: hey Government, use the 78 recommendations!

Timely too. Now that the Government has discovered a \$1.8bn surplus, they'll have the fiscal wiggle room to do things.

If we keep reminding them.
