MY JOURNEY TO INTERFAITH SPIRITUALITY

"There will be no peace among the nations without peace among the religions. There will be no peace among the religions without dialogue among the religions." —Hans Küng

It was a belief in the strength of dialogue which led me to the path of interfaith ministry. After the terrible tragedy of the September 11th attack on the World Trade Center in New York, I felt a strong calling to attend seminary, but it took about 20 years before I was able to make this dream a reality. The toll of war carried out in the name of religious faith had only been increasing in that time; Israel vs Palestine, India vs Pakistan, Iraq and Afghanistan vs the USA as well as conflicts in the Balkans, Sudan, Africa and Myanmar have left thousands dead and millions displaced.

I am a member of the Society of Friends (Quakers Aotearoa New Zealand Tē Hāhi Tūhauwiri). The Quaker values of peace, integrity, equality, simplicity and sustainability still inform my life practices but I wanted something more: the ability to minister to others of different faiths and callings, or even no faith at all. So I decided, in 2019, to sign up for the Interfaith/Interspiritual Seminary program offered by One Spirit Learning Alliance in New York City. This learning center was founded in 2002 by Rev Diane Berke to train interfaith ministers to serve in a complex and interrelated multicultural world and support those working for peace and justice.

Though it may seem unfamiliar and new, the interfaith movement has been growing and developing over many years. The 1893 Parliament of World Religions is often seen as the beginning of the interfaith movement, bringing together members of the Buddhist, Hindu, Christian, Moslem, Jain, Bahá'i and other faiths. This parliament continues to meet and encourage a global dialogue between faiths to promote peace and understanding. The last meeting in 2018, was opened by an address by His Holiness the Dalai Lama. Locally, the Dunedin area is privileged to host two groups working to create peace and understanding between peoples; The Interfaith Council includes members from the Latter-day Saints, Buddhists, several Christian faiths, Quakers and others, while the Dunedin Abrahamic Interfaith Group brings together Jews, Christians and Muslims in dialogue.

My two years at One Spirit was intense and I made lifelong friendships. I studied both major and minor spiritual traditions throughout the world so that I would be able to listen to others with some understanding of their beliefs, and speak without prejudice or misconceptions. I learned how to create services to mark life's milestones; baby naming ceremonies, weddings and funerals. But more than that I learned to walk with others on their spiritual journeys, providing support and companionship without proselytising for any given faith. I trust in Spirit to lead people on the path that is uniquely suited to their life and circumstances.

Though I learned a great deal at One Spirit I feel as though I have only begun on my journey towards effective ministry. I plan to undertake a Post Graduate Certificate in Chaplaincy at the University of Otago next year. While this qualification is focussed on Christian theological practice, I believe it will give me more tools with which to help others navigate the exigencies of life and faith. Serving at Mornington Methodist will give me experience in the real world and that is what I look forward to the most.
